The Purpose of Religion

Many people whose lives are characterized by faith, integrity, and compassion, find little or no meaning in religion, religious practice, or church affiliation. "I am spiritual," they might say "but I'm not religious." Institutional religion can seem peripheral at best and hypocritical at worst in relation to living out our everyday attempts to be responsible, caring, spiritually attuned people.

Some of the most outspoken proponents of institutional religion seem to be more captive than free, more narrow than open, more dead than alive. But true religion is a life-giving phenomenon that is meant to nurture our souls. It is a dimension of the human experience that can speak to the heart of who we are and what life is all about. Because this is true, it is important to grapple with the truths proclaimed by religious institutions even when they cease to make sense to us; there is usually a baby in the bathwater.



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
Since the focus of healthy religion, one that has not lost its spiritual moorings, is God understood as incarnate in nature and human nature, religious practices can have meaning only if they address the reality of our true self, our relationships, our everyday lives. Religion cannot, and need not be a Sabbath only affair whose purpose is to help us get through life unscathed by sin. It must be about passion more than piety, celebration not just obligation, life as well as liturgy. It must be a positive force, both alive and enlivening, that speaks to and about the mystery of our being, and the being of Mystery.

All of the great founders of religious movements have been both passionate and compassionate people. They loved what they believed and they lived what they loved. The spirit of their teachings, which have to do with the transcendent and the eminent, the spirit and the soul, heaven and earth, address the height and depth of what it means to be human. Religion that is not diluted by ecclesiastical or societal convention is a significant dimension of the human experience because it serves to remind us of, and give expression to what is most basic to life. It can rebind (re ligare) us to God understood as one with creation, to our true selves, and to the human community.




A Retreat with Thich Nhat Hanh

Varieties of Religious Experience


by William James, A Mentor Book

He re-examines the rightful function of Judeo-Christian symbols as keys to spiritual understanding and mystical revelation.
